## Miss Eleanor Roosevelt Braman Married In Queens to Dr. Thomas A. McGraw

WOODMERE, L. I., Oct. 27—White autumn blossoms formed a floral background this afternoon in St. John's Protestant Episcopal Church, Far Rockaway, Queens, for the marriage of Miss Eleanor Roosevelt Braman, daughter of Mrs. Hall Braman of Woodmere and Chester Alwyn Braman of 580 Park Avenue, New York, and Old Chatham, N. Y., to Dr. Thomas Arthur McGraw, son of Dr. and Mrs. Arthur Butler McGraw of Grosse Pointe, Mich.

The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Herbert H. Hill. A small reception for members of the immediate families and a few close friends was held at the Rockaway Hunting Club in Cedarhurst.

Given in marriage by her father, the bride wore a princess gown of ivory satin trimmed with rosepoint lace and made with a fitted bodice finished with long sleeves pointed at the wrists and edged with lace, and a full skirt with long train. She wore an heirloom veil of antique rosepoint lace arranged in cap fashion, that had been worn by many generations of brides in her family, and carried a cascade bouquet of eucharis lilies and stephanotis.

Miss Mary L. Braman was maid of honor for her sister. The other bridal attendants were Miss Grace McGraw, sister of the bridegroom; Mrs. Robert Ziesing of Cleveland, Mrs. William V. M. Fawcett Jr. of Annisquam, Mass., and the Misses Jane Imbs of New York, Eleanor S. Keady of Bryn Mawr, Pa., and Dora Jean Irvine of Scarsdale, N. Y.

All of the bridal attendants wore gowns of pale blue bengaline made with fitted bodices, bouffant skirts, and short capes of pale blue tulle. They wore bandeaux of blue flowers in lieu of hats. The maid of honor carried a bouquet of white orchids and dark red gloriosa,

while the other attendants carried bouquets of ivory-colored chrysanthemums and dark red gloriosa.

Robert S. McGraw was best man for his brother. The ushers were Arthur C. Ketcham, William N. Wallace, Dr. E. W. Davis and John L. Morrissey, all of New York, and Wellington Watters, Ferdinando Cinelli, Charles H. Hodges 3d and Seabourne R. Livingstone, all of Grosse Pointe.

After a wedding trip, the couple will make their home in Durham, N. C., while Dr. McGraw is serving his internship at Duke Hospital.

The bride attended the Lawrence School in Hewlett, was graduated from Miss Porter's School in Farmington, Conn., and studied also at Vassar College. She was introduced to society during the 1947 season at the Junior Assemblies and at a dinner dance given for her by her father.

Mrs. McGraw is a granddaughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Chester A. Braman and of the late Mr. and Mrs. Edward L. Hall of New York.

On the side of her mother, the former Miss Anna Eleanor Roosevelt Hall, a cousin of Mrs. Franklin Delano Roosevelt, the bride is a great-granddaughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Valentine G. Hall of New York and Tivoli-on-Hudson. Her paternal grandfather, the late Chester A. Braman, was at one time president of A. D. Juilliard & Co., New York textile manufacturers.

Dr. McGraw is an alumnus of the Hill School in Pottstown, Pa., and Yale College. He was graduated in June from the Medical College of Cornell University. He served as a lieutenant (j.g.) in the Navy from 1943 to 1946 in the Pacific theatre.
